Indiana University Athletics

Assembly Hall & Cook Hall

Open since October 1971, Assembly Hall is the home of the Hoosiers basketball teams, and the NCAA basketball championship banners. Cook Hall opened in 2010 and serves as the daily headquarters for the basketball programs and houses the Shine Legacy Court, a historical exhibit of photos, artifacts, trophies and interactive displays. **1001 East 17th Street**

Bill Armstrong Stadium

Opened in 1981, Armstrong Stadium features the natural grass Jerry Yeagley Soccer Field and that famous 1/4 mile cinder track. Home to the Hoosiers Women's soccer team and seven-time NCAA champion men's soccer team, and also the annual "Little 500" bicycle race. **North of 17th Street on Fee Lane**

Memorial Stadium Athletic Complex

Home to the IU football team, Memorial Stadium opened in 1960 and is also known as "the Rock." Improvements to the stadium were completed in 2009, including enclosing the north end zone, a student support center and training facility. **North of 17th Street**

Outdoor Pool

The IU Outdoor Pool is open to the public from early May through late September. Features include an instructional pool for children, a 10-lane, 50-meter lap pool and diving facility. Daily passes are available. **Located at 17th Street and Fee Lane 812-855-9584 • www.indiana.edu/~iuop**

Tennis Center

The IU Tennis Center features eight indoor tennis courts with lessons and clinics available for all ages and skill levels. The Health, Physical Education & Recreation Building

Music, Speakers & Performances

IU is the home of world-renowned music and theatre departments, hosting over a thousand performances a year. Catch a terrific student performance or a national touring artist at one of the magnificent campus venues.

Indiana University Auditorium

Originally built as a Federal Works Agency Project in 1941, the auditorium was renovated in the late 1990s and continues to host some of the world's top performers. 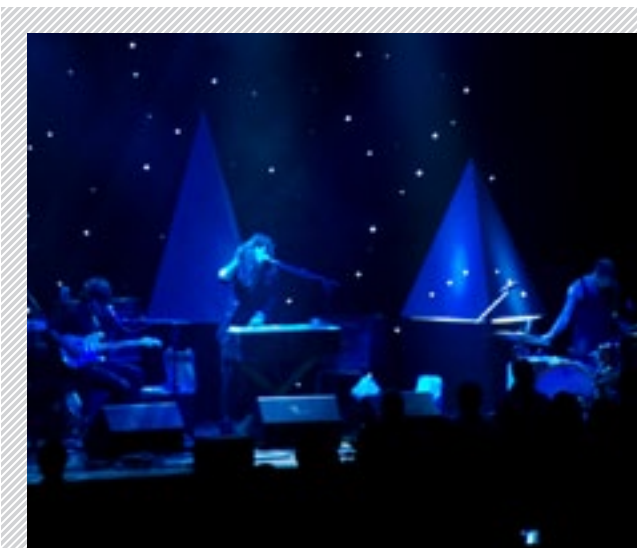

IU Auditorium

This magnificent auditorium is located in the heart of campus and provides a venue for the university's major events. Opened in 1941, this grand facility plays host to lectures, ceremonies, receptions and musical and theater performances by campus groups and national artists. Beyond the beautiful performance space, the IU Auditorium also houses two amazing attractions: the Thomas Hart Benton murals "Century of Progress" and the massive IU Auditorium organ which contains 4,543 pipes. Jacobs School of Music

The Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University is one of the most acclaimed music schools in the country, with many programs ranked in the top ten. This amazing institution produces over 1,000 performances a year, from student recitals to elaborate operas, in world-class venues right in the heart of campus. The quantity of shows is matched by the tremendous quality, as is evident by the distinguished alumni including renowned violinist and Grammy Award winner Joshua Bell (shown), soprano Angela Brown who has performed with leading opera companies including the Metropolitan Opera, and soprano Sylvia McNair, who has performed worldwide and is now a professor with the Jacobs School of Music. Q & A with David Baker

Q. What makes Bloomington so special?

A. There are so many things that make it special. First, you are exposed to so many different things- wall to wall music, various cultures and events, ethnic restaurants, all the things you'd find in a large city, it's right here in Bloomington. But better than a large city, it's a safe community, it's very drivable and it's inexpensive.

Q. Describe the music scene in Bloomington.

A. The music scene offers so much variety and you can really get a sense of what's happening culturally in the community through the music being performed. The music school has a tremendous impact on the music scene too, with well-known musicians performing next to up-and-coming young students. You can find music of all genres in performance halls, nightclubs and in unique venues- it's like a cornucopia of music. Live music is so vital to really experiencing music, and you can find opportunities to listen to live music all over this city.

Q. What's your favorite local musician/group or music venue?

A. The Jacobs School of Music is just exceptional; David Miller and the Jazz Fables are wonderful; Bear's Place is a great place to catch jazz; the IU Auditorium brings in some great national acts. It's like you can just sit right in Bloomington and see the whole universe.

Q. Besides enjoying music, what's your next favorite thing to do in Bloomington?

A. I like to treat this city as a smorgasboard, do a little bit of everything. My family is here so I can go to some of the amazing school performances. Family time is important so it's nice to have places to enjoy family activities together. We like to go out to eat too, and there are plenty of places to do that in Bloomington.

Q. If you could recommend one thing for a visitor to experience while in town, what would it be?

A. I have to recommend they come to a jazz concert!

Indiana Geological Survey (IGS)

For nearly 170 years, the state of Indiana has relied on the IGS for maps and other geological information. Displays feature plant fossils, trace fossils, caves, coal mining, mapping and cartography and limestone quarrying. Indiana University Art Museum

With over 40,000 objects, the IU Art Museum's collections include works representing nearly every art-producing culture throughout history. Explore ancient Greek pottery, gold jewelry, Renaissance panels, and Asian treasures dating back to the third millennium B.C. Discover paintings by Pablo Picasso, Claude Monet, and Jackson Pollock. Learn about other cultures as you view art from Africa, the South Pacific, and the Americas—the museum's African collection is considered among the best in the country. A work of art in its own right, the museum's stunning building was designed by internationally renowned architect I.M. Pei, also responsible for the Louvre Pyramid in Paris. 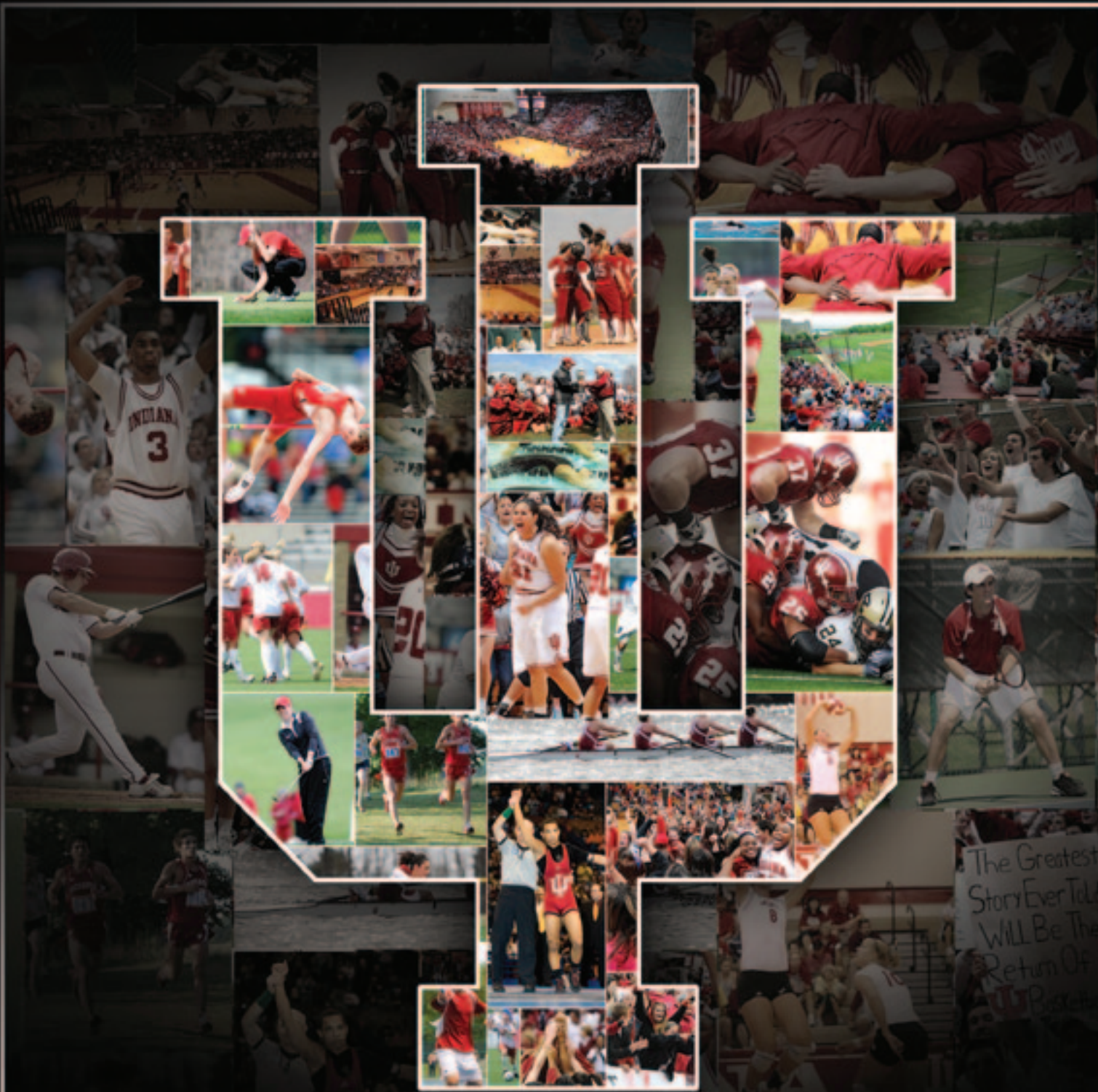

Lilly Library

Arboretum

The Arboretum is an oasis of beauty, featuring hundreds of flowering trees and greenery. A gazebo overlooks walking and bicycle paths and a pond. Beck Chapel

A small non-denominational chapel where students can spend time in prayer or study, Beck Chapel is open seven days a week and contains versions of the Bible, Koran, and Torah. Many alumni couples return to the university to be married at Beck Chapel. *Next to the Indiana Memorial Union*

Dunn Meadow

A place for both celebration and demonstration, Dunn Meadow has been the scene of many candlelight vigils, concerts, festivals, rallies, protests and outdoor classes over the years. *At the Corner of Indiana Avenue and 7th Street*

Jordan Hall Greenhouse

Kirkwood Observatory

Built in 1900, and named after Daniel Kirkwood, an astronomer and IU professor of mathematics, this stargazing facility contains a 12-inch refractor telescope. Metz Carillon Tower

The Carillon Tower was named for Dr. Arthur R. Metz, who founded the Metz Scholarship Program at IU in 1955. The tower features 61 cast bells, each with a special inscription. *17th Street and Jordan Avenue*

Showalter Fountain

The centerpiece of the IU Fine Arts Plaza features the two-ton sculpture of the 'Birth of Venus,' which represents the goddess of love and beauty. It was designed by the late artist and former IU faculty member Ralph Laurent and brought to the campus in 1958. *Fine Arts Plaza • East 7th Street*

Rose Well House

Donated in 1908 and designed by Arthur Foley, the stone portals of this open-air pavilion were the portals of the Old College Building dating to 1855. Legend has it a female freshman is not a true coed until she is kissed under the dome of the Well House at midnight. *North edge of Dunn Woods*

Sample Gates

The iconic Sample Gates serve as a welcoming entryway for students and visitors into the university's beautiful 1,860-acre campus. Built of Indiana limestone in 1987, the gates mark the edge of the Old Crescent, the site of campus buildings built between 1884 and 1908. *At the corner of Indiana and Kirkwood Avenues*

Jill's House

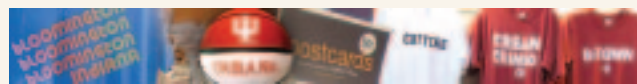
